Beginning with the Christmas 2022 show and continuing over the summer of 2023, our Society held five flower shows.

It was pleasing to see that over the course of the season the number of entries in the horticultural divisions of the shows soon grew to pre-pandemic levels. The number of entries in the design divisions remained sparse with only a few members entering designs. A total of 20 members entered the shows over the year.

At the April general meeting Doris Fischer-Jenssen and Pam Wright presented a short program on flower-showing tips and what the judge is looking for. This was well received by the members and reflected in the quality of entries placed on the show tables.

A special thank you goes to those members who helped with show set-up and clean-up and those who served as judges' clerks. This year, two high school students assisted with the flower show tasks as they worked towards gaining their community volunteer hours. Their help was appreciated.

Finally, a special thank you to Barb Tang, who stayed as flower show point scorer and produced the necessary facts and figures for the year-end awards.

Flower Show Rules

Monthly Shows

General

- All exhibitors must be paid members of Markham Garden & Horticultural Society.
- Exhibits must be placed between 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. No exceptions!
- All entries will be judged according to Ontario Judging Standards for Horticulture and Floral Design 2019 Edition.
- No exhibit is entitled to a prize unless declared worthy by a judge. The decisions of the judge(s) are final.
- All space is allocated on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Any youth wishing to place an entry in the show may do so, and the entry will be judged on its merits. Any design entry must be in keeping with the theme of the show.
- Exhibitors must provide their own containers. A basket is a container made of natural materials or metal, glass, pottery etc., in a basket shape with or without a handle.
- Any exhibit showing evidence of disease and/or insect infestation will be removed from the show table.
- The use of scarce, protected, or endangered native plants such as wild orchid, trillium, etc., in an exhibit requires that the exhibit be disqualified by the Show Committee.

Horticulture

 Entries are limited to 2 per member in each class, except in "any" or "any other" and all houseplant classes, in which there is no limit. Multiple entries in a class must be of different cultivars.

- In display, collection, pot-et-fleur, and terrarium classes, only one entry is permitted.
- Specimen exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor and must be labelled by variety or cultivar wherever possible. This is helpful to viewers and creates interest.
- Houseplants must have been in the exhibitor's care for at least 3 months prior to the show.
- Dried/treated material in Section B of the November show need not have been grown by the exhibitor.
- More or fewer blooms, stems etc., than the number called for, will disqualify an exhibit. Note: A bud showing colour is considered a bloom.

Design

- Entries are limited to **one** per member in the design classes.
- Exhibits in design classes must be solely the work of the exhibitor.
- Novice classes in design are open to any member who has not won more than three (3) first prizes in preceding years.
- Flowers and other materials used in design classes can be obtained from any source.
- A miniature design has maximum dimensions no more than 12.7cm (5 in) in height, width and depth including any container, base and/or accessories.
- A small design measures from 13.9cm/5.5in to 25.4cm/10in. and must not exceed 25.4cm/10in. in any direction (height, width or depth).
- Judicious use of dried, treated, painted and/or artificially coloured plant material is permitted in the design classes only, unless otherwise stated in the schedule.

Exhibiting Information

General

- **Read the flower show rules in the previous section.** There is important information there.
- Read each monthly show schedule carefully to see what is required for each class. OJES is a reference to Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticulture and Design 2019. (Send a note to mghs1920@gmail.com, c/o Pam Wright if you do not possess this publication and need exhibiting advice from it.).
- Prepare your exhibits for the show, taking note of the number of specimens required. Use a clear container, if possible.
- Bring your exhibits to the meeting before 7:30 p.m. and place them on the show tables.
- Complete an entry card (see the example at the end of this section) and place with your exhibit. Blank entry cards are on the preparation table near the show tables.

Horticultural Specimens

- The term A.O.C is short for Any Other Cultivar and means any other cultivar/variety/species not listed above in the schedule.
- If a specific flower size is asked for, measure the blooms; if a branch size is specified, that will be the actual length of the branch.
- If more than one specimen is called for ensure that they are as similar in size, height etc. as possible.


- Exhibits should be free of disease and/or insect infestation.
- Faded and spent flowers should be removed as invisibly as possible; leaves that are marred, broken, dead or yellowed should be removed.
- Remember that a bud showing colour is considered a bloom, so carefully disbud before showing a single bloom.
- Poppies and Euphorbia that exude white latex benefit from searing the stem ends.
- Dahlias, Roses and Rudbeckia benefit from placing the stems in very hot water for a minute or two before placing in cold water.
- An exhibition Hybrid Tea Rose bloom should be ½ to ¾ open when viewed from the top.
- When showing roses, a modern rose spray should have at least two blooms in the spray that are at least half or more open. (This does not apply to old garden and species roses which should have at least one bloom half open and a bud showing colour).
- When showing collections of cut flowers or herbs, place a list of displayed plant material beside the entry; botanical and common name is a plus.

Potted Plants

- Potted plants need to be clean and free from dust, debris and pests.
- Containers for potted plants should be clean and the top layer of soil cultivated to give a fresh appearance.

Fruits and vegetables

- Entries should be clean and free from excessive blemishes, insect or disease damage.
- Fruit and vegetables should be exhibited on a plate.
- Leaf vegetables should be exhibited in a container of water.
- See OJES 2019 page 108 or OJES 2003 page 69 for suggested number of various specimens to be entered in Any Other Variety classes.
